Did you know you are a mammal? Mammals are an incredibly diverse group of animals. How do we know it's a mammal?

All have hair or fur and are warm blooded. Most young are born live, not hatched from eggs.

Females have special glands called mammary glands, with which they feed their young milk. They take good care of their babies.

They have specialized teeth, depending on what they eat.

They all have four legs.

Lets look at what we might find in the park.

Rodents make up 40% of all Mammal species. Their front teeth, the incisors, never stop growing so they have to gnaw a lot to keep them worn down.
