Safety First

Junior Rangers need to be aware of potential dangers when exploring outdoors! Please read this page very carefully so you know what to look out for!

Poison Ivy

You might see poison ivy growing on the ground or up a tree trunk as a hairy vine. Each leaflet is made up of 3 leaves, and may have smooth or notched edges. When some people touch the plant they develop skin irritations. Leaves of 3, let them be!



Ticks

Look out for ticks when walking around outside! Ticks can make you very itchy and some of them carry diseases. If you do see a tick on you, let an adult know and they can help you remove them safely!

Snakes

Most snakes in Virginia are harmless and very few are aggressive. The only venomous snake at Staunton River State Park is the Northern Copperhead. Look for a triangular shaped head, cat-like eyes, and hourglass patterns going down the center of its back. Copperheads are not aggressive. If you see one just back away from it and give it space.




